Pentagon says intel contractors went too far: A high-level Pentagon inquiry has concluded that military contractors overstepped their legal authority in gathering intelligence in Afghanistan and Pakistan. The report says their information ended up being used to kill or capture militants. The classified report accuses defense contractor and retired U.S. Army officer Michael Furlong of running what amounted to an illegal spying ring of military contractors. Furlong denied the accusations in an interview.

Texas A&M lockdown lifted: Texas A&M University has lifted a lockdown on its main campus after a report of a suspected gunman on campus turned out to be a person with a replica weapon. University spokesman Lane Stephenson had said a campus bus driver was on his route around 4 p.m. Thursday when he reported seeing a person carrying a weapon, possibly a rifle, near the student union. About 90 minutes later, A&M officials determined that the person was actually someone carrying a replica weapon. NYC looks to curb harassment of women: Whistles, catcalls and lewd come-ons from strangers are all too familiar to women in New York City, where lawmakers are examining whether something should be done. A City Council committee heard testimony Thursday from women who said men follow them, yell at them and make them feel unsafe and uncomfortable. Women told the City Council that they want a public awareness campaign and legislation that would include "no harassment zones" around schools. Suspect in Mo. shootings nabbed: A man already facing theft charges was captured Thursday as a suspect in a series of fatal central Missouri shootings that had prompted police to warn anyone associated with him to flee the area. Joshua William Maylee, 23, was taken into custody about 1:30 p.m. without incident in Cooper County, several dozen miles west of where the shootings occurred Maylee, of Holts Summit, has

not been charged in connection with the shootings that left three people dead and one wounded, but police have said they want to question him.

Driverless vans complete 8,000-mile trip: Four driverless electric vans successfully ended an 8,000-mile test drive from Italy to China — a modern-day version of Marco Polo's journey around the world — with their arrival at the Shanghai Expo on Thursday. The vehicles, equipped with four solar-powered laser scanners and seven video cameras that work together to detect and avoid obstacles, are part of an experiment aimed at improving road safety and advancing automotive technology. Though the vans were driverless and mapless, they did carry researchers as passengers just in case of emergencies. The experimenters did have to intervene a few times — when the vehicles got snarled in a Moscow traffic jam and to handle toll stations.

# State offers DUI video online, argues against policy in court


AG: Salmon case points out 'inconsistencies'

Attorney General William Sorrell said Thursday he was surprised to learn the state Department of Public Safety was promoting on its website the sale of DUI videos taken by state police cruisers while his office was arguing in court that such videos should not be made public.

"I didn't know about it until I read about it in the paper this morning," Sorrell said. "I think they realize now that there's some inconsistency in that."

Sorrell made his remarks as the department, complying with a judge's order issued Wednesday, made public a November 2009 cruiser video showing state Auditor Tom Salmon being stopped and eventually arrested in Montpelier for drunken driving. Assistant Attorney General Kate Whelley McCabe had argued in court on the department's behalf that the video was part of a criminal investigation and therefore was exempt from disclosure under the state's publicrecords law. Salmon, a two-term auditor who switched from the

#### Russian military testfires ballistic missiles:

Russia's military on Thursday successfully test-fired three intercontinental ballistic missiles in one day during training of its strategic forces. The Defense Ministry said the Bryansk nuclear submarine of the navy's Northern Fleet on Thursday launched a Sineva missile from the Barents Sea at a range on the Kamchatka Peninsula. Another nuclear sub, the Georgy Pobedonosets of the Pacific Fleet, test fired an RSM-50 from the Sea of Okhotsk at a testing range in the northwestern Arkhangelsk region.

Volcano claims 'key holder'

For 33 years, man led rituals to quiet Indonesian mountain

MOUNT MERAPI, Indonesia - He was the keeper of Mount Merapi - an 83-year-old man entrusted to watch over the volcano's spirits, believing it could be appeased by tossing offerings of rice, chickens and flowers into the gaping crater.

And when the eruption came, Maridjan was among those who died, along with dozens of villagers who believed him, not seismologists or government officials, about the danger.

As Merapi began spewing 1,800-degree gases and thousands of panicked people streamed down the

mountain's slopes, Maridjan refused to budge from his home deep in the evacuation zone, just four miles from the crater.

His rigid body was found Wednesday, prostrate in the Islamic prayer position and caked in heavy white soot. Nearby was an Indonesian Red Cross volunteer who had been trying to persuade him to leave.

Twin catastrophes struck within 24 hours in different parts of the seismically active country, severely testing Indonesia's emergency response network.

At least 370 people were killed by an earthquake and tidal surge Wednesday and 33 died in the eruption.

Thursday, politicians, soap opera stars and singers were among hun-
